From saving lives to receiving awards

Hillsdale volunteer honoured

15 October 2009. Hillsdale resident Daniel Chan gives up his spare time to provide first aid at local community and sporting events, but on Saturday 10 October, the St John Ambulance Cadet paused from helping injured people to receive an award for his voluntary work.

Daniel was awarded the Grand Prior Badge, the highest badge that can be achieved by a St John Cadet. During the course of three years—minimum time it takes to achieve this badge— Daniel completed several difficult tasks and training.

The Grand Prior is the only badge Cadets are allowed to wear when they become adult volunteers.

St John (NSW), which is a self-funded charity and has been providing first aid services to the community for over 125 years, awarded its volunteers for their long term commitment.

St John (NSW) also recognized members of the public for providing outstanding first aid in various emergency situations and awarded several organisations for their support to St John.

Sean Gavin, CEO of St John (NSW), said the volunteers give up their time willingly and regularly to provide a service they believe in.

“They have quietly yet effectively assisted those in need at local sporting and cultural events as well as in large gatherings like the Sydney World Masters Games, Big Day Out, New Year’s Eve celebrations and the City to Surf.

“Other St John volunteers assist primary school aged children with reading and writing, while another group of volunteers assist Health Department nurses with the NSW Schools immunization Program.

“It’s an honour to recognise their contribution through this award ceremony”, Mr Gavin said.

In addition to its volunteer services, St John (NSW) has trained many hundreds of thousands of people in first aid. In many cases, this training has resulted in ordinary people having the courage, confidence and skills to manage an emergency situation, and in so doing, saving lives.

In 2008, when St John Ambulance celebrated its 125 years of service in Australia, over 3,500 volunteers provided more than 450,000 hours of voluntary service across the state in the areas of first aid, early literacy, immunisation and ophthalmic care.
